Professional and Personal Counseling

When students experience life events or academic pressures that leave them feeling anxious, confused, lonely, angry, depressed, or overwhelmed, it is often helpful to speak with an unbiased, "objective" professional. Confidential evaluation services are available at the Law Center and at the Main Campus through Georgetown's Counseling and Psychiatric Service (CAPS). Generally, counselors will meet with students up to three times and will then help students to find an ongoing counselor at the Main Campus or in the community if necessary. Daytime Appointments: Appointments for both CAPS locations are made through the Main Campus Intake Coordinator at 687-6985. Daytime hours are available in the Counseling Office at L-102-G in the Gewirz Center, adjacent to the Student Health Center, or on the Main Campus in 1 Darnall Hall, next to the Medical Center.

After Hours Emergencies: Should you need to call the Counseling and Psychiatric Service (CAPS) outside normal working hours, you may call the University operator at 444-7243 to page the doctor on call. In the event of an evening or weekend emergency, students can also see the psychiatric resident on call at the Georgetown University Hospital Emergency Room. Georgetown University Hospital is located at 3800 Reservoir Road, NW, Washington, DC 20007. Calling 911 for emergencies is always an option as well. 911 is the best number to call if there is an immediate threat to life or property.

Off Campus Counseling: D.C. Bar Lawyer Assistance Program

For students who prefer to seek counseling off campus, the DC Bar Lawyer Assistance Program (202-347-3131) offers free and confidential counseling to law students who experience problems that interfere with their personal or professional lives. The program serves students and lawyers dealing with alcoholism or drug abuse, stress, and a range of emotional problems. The program offers access to trained professional counselors, assessment and referral services, ongoing personal counseling, and contacts with students and lawyers in the community who have experienced similar problems. Sexual Assault and Relationship Violence Counseling

The emotional impact of sexual assault and/or relationship violence is unique for each individual. Many find it helpful to talk with a counselor trained to understand and assist survivors of sexual assault and/or relationship violence. Laura Cutway, the Sexual Assault and Relationship Violence Liaison, is available during regular business hours to provide confidential information, explain law enforcement and judicial options, discuss the pros and cons of reporting and adjudication, assist with safety arrangements, discuss medical and counseling options, and put students in touch with a professional counselor on or off campus. Regardless of how much time has passed, help is available. You may also contact Jennifer Schweer, the Sexual Assault & Health Issues Coordinator on the Main Campus.
