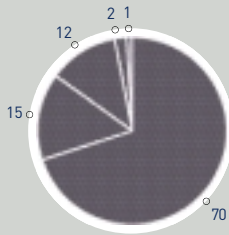
CLASS OF 2003 SALARIES

\$42,000 Median Salary for Public Sector

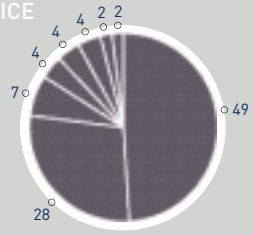
TYPE OF PRACTICE

First year students are enrolled in either the "A" or the "B" curriculum. Full time students in the "A" curriculum take eight courses, including a three-credit elective in the spring semester chosen from a group of "perspective" courses. Part time students in the "A" curriculum take six required courses the first year and two in the second year.

The "B" curriculum requires seven courses somewhat different in emphasis and organization from those in the "A" curriculum.
