One reviewed the structure and functioning of the institution's email system and made decisions about upgrading and improving it. A second functioned for several years as an institution wide exchange of information and ideas. The third reviewed candidates to oversee the computer and technology security systems at the university.

I built and am now serving as the webmaster for the web site of the Society of American Law Teachers. I also built and serve as webmaster for both the law office and art websites of my wife, Elizabeth Langer.

During the 1994-1995 academic year I was a Faculty Fellow in Computer-Assisted Legal Instruction, sponsored by the Center for Computer-Assisted Legal Instruction, a consortium organization supported by most American law schools. This fellowship assisted my development of a computerized negotiation exercise for use in standard property courses.

COMMITTEE WORK:

In addition to the standard committee work all faculty members do, I have been deeply enmeshed in some atypical facets of Georgetown's life. In the last decade we have planned for and constructed a new library, remodeled our main office and classroom building, developed a dormitory and student center, planned an addition to the primary office and classroom building, constructed a second library, classroom and office building, and built a large athletic and fitness complex.
