Please join us the afternoon of Wednesday, April 11 on the twelfth floor of Gewirz as the authors from our Winter Issue present their articles in a discussion moderated by Visiting Professor Noah Novogrodsky. Professor Stromseth will discuss the balancing that must happen between all of accountability, reconciliation, and national judicial capacity-building in a post-atrocity situation, evaluating this balance through the experience of many international criminal case studies; Ms. Nienke Grossman will discuss whether child soldiers should be prosecuted for committing atrocities and the international legal rules that should influence such a decision; and Mr. Alex Little will address how literature on the harm to victim autonomy during no-drop prosecutions in domestic violence situations illuminates a similar issue in international criminal prosecutions. Also joining the discussion is Professor Gregory Gordon from the University of North Dakota Law School. Professor Gordon will discuss the limitations on the development of international criminal procedure, as well as ways that those hurdles might be overcome.
