## **Makerere University Refugee Law Project**

Refugee Law Project (RLP) was established in November 1999 as an autonomous project within the Faculty of Law of Makerere University in Uganda, with the aim of protecting and promoting refugees' rights. Since then it has grown rapidly and become an important resource for refugees and asylum seekers in Uganda. It combines this direct service provision with research and advocacy as well as with education and training of other stakeholders. Through this combination of activities it has rapidly gained a national and international reputation as a critical and independent voice on matters relating to refugees and IDPs, as well as associated questions of conflict and transitional justice in Uganda. Each component of the RLP works in concert with the others. The Legal Aid & Counselling Clinic might receive information that refugees in a certain area not being treated fairly according to their rights. The Research & Advocacy Department would then visit the camp to examine the situation and determine the necessary actions to take. After an evaluation, the Education & Training Department could be called upon to conduct trainings to camp administrators to work through issues related to the rights of refugees or more progressive interpretations of existing laws. At each stage, the flow of information

between departments allows the RLP to take coherent, concrete steps to help improve the lives of displaced persons in Uganda and East Africa. The RLP has a working paper series with 19 papers produced to date, and aims to produce academically rigorous yet accessible research and writing.

The main focus of the group's research is displacement taking place within state boundaries, and it aims to make visible the connections between displacement, war, environment and development. The group has developed actor-oriented approaches to the study of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), and case studies have primarily adhered to qualitative methodologies and participatory approaches. Some of the questions addressed in the studies associated with the group are: Who can be defined as IDPs and refugees? What is the relationship between different types of migrants (IDPs, refugees, returnees, relocated persons)? How can causes and consequences of flight be identified and explained? How can complex humanitarian emergencies be understood? How do displaced people develop livelihood strategies individually and in cooperation with human agencies and governments? What are the links between displacement, environment and development? Together with the Internal Displacement Monitoring Centre, the group received funding from the Research Council of Norway to set up a network for researchers working with internal displacement. The main activity of the network is the establishment of a searchable database with information about researchers, projects and publications concerning IDPs.
