Lorian Hardcastle is a Fellow at the O'Neill Institute for National and Global Health Law at Georgetown University Law Center. She completed her J.D. (with Health Law and Policy Specialization Certificate) at Dalhousie University, and her LL.M. at the University of Toronto. Lorian is currently an S.J.D. candidate at the University of Toronto. Her dissertation focuses on governmental health sector tort liability and, more broadly, the balance between judicial competence to adjudicate complex health policy matters and governmental accountability. Prior to commencing graduate studies, Lorian worked in the legal department of a hospital, at a Canadian law firm with a substantial health practice and, most recently, as a Senior Policy Advisor at the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. From 2007-2010, Lorian taught Health Care Law in the Faculty of Health at York University in Toronto.

Lorian's primary research interests are health system financing and organization, constitutional health law issues, comparative health policy, the regulation and governance of the health care system, and health system accountability and liability. She has published papers in several legal and health policy journals including the Journal of Law, Medicine and Ethics, the University of Pennsylvania Law Review, the Queen's University Law Journal, the McGill Journal of Law and Medicine, the University of Alberta Health Law Journal, and the Canadian Medical Association Journal.
