Assisted Reproduction is a multi-billion dollar, world-wide industry focused upon helping people have children. However, the tides are changing. As many children born of these technologies have reached adulthood, and have begun having their own families, they have increasingly called for information about their 'donors' – the person(s) who contributed their gametes to enable their conception.
