

The Constitution Project is an independent, think tank in Washington, D.C. that promotes and defends constitutional safeguards. By assembling bipartisan coalitions of policy experts, legal scholars, and former government officials, we seek consensus solutions to difficult legal and constitutional issues. The Project focuses on the rule of law and criminal justice issues central to politics and governance. Among the issues the Constitution Project addresses are capital punishment, liberty and security after 9/11, judicial independence, indigent defense, criminal sentencing, war powers, checks and balances, and the constitutional amendment process. The Constitution Project (CP) has opportunities for law student interns and fellows fall, spring and summer semesters. Interns and fellows work closely with the Project's attorneys, communications experts, and other staff. Students will learn about the legislative process, and about how the Constitution Project achieves consensus on the controversial legal and constitutional issues that are in today's headlines. They will also learn about how policy initiatives are publicized and promoted in Washington, and about the work of a variety of public policy and interest organizations in Washington and around the country.

Externs will work closely with the Project's attorneys, communications experts, and other staff. Activities will include legal research, drafting and editing amicus briefs and other publications, conducting limited outreach to committee members, policymakers, and the press, assisting with the logistics and planning of events such as panel discussions and press briefings, and attending congressional hearings. Externs will learn about the legislative process, how policy initiatives are publicized and promoted in Washington, and about the work of a variety of public policy and interest organizations in Washington and around the country.
