Stephanie Barclay

Stephanie Barclay is a Professor of Law at Georgetown Law School, and the Faculty Co-Director of the Georgetown Center for the Constitution. Her research focuses on the role our different democratic institutions play in protecting minority rights, particularly at the intersection of free speech and religious exercise. Barclay's work is published or is forthcoming in leading journals such as the Harvard Law Review, the Chicago Law Review, the University of Pennsylvania Law Review, and the Yale Law Journal Forum. Stephanie will be completing her research project "Making Constitutional Adjudication Safe for Democracy," and collaborating with other scholars in her field located in London and Oxford.

Maria Glover

Carmack Waterhouse Professor of Law

Maria Glover is a leading expert in the fields of civil procedure and civil justice; complex litigation; and private litigation and dispute resolution. Her writing has appeared in the Stanford Law Review, the Yale Law Journal, the N.Y.U. Law Review, the University of Pennsylvania Law Review, and elsewhere. In 2023, she was awarded Berkeley Law's Civil Justice Research Initiative's Best Article Prize for *Mass Arbitration*, published in the Stanford Law Review. In 2023, she was elected to the membership of the American Law Institute. Maria will be working on two sets of articles on the topic of third-party litigation finance, primarily one entitled "The Civil Justice Business", a broad-sweeping study of the rise of a global market for legal finance, with a particular focus on its growth in the UK and transition to the United States.



Mitt Regan

McDevitt Professor of Jurisprudence; Co-Director, Center on National Security and the Law; Director, Center on the Legal Profession

Professor Mitt Regan is McDevitt Professor of Jurisprudence and Coordinator of the Program on Law, Ethics, and International Security at Georgetown Law Center, where he teaches course on International Law, National Security, Human Rights, and Artificial Intelligence. While at CSET, Professor Regan will be working on a project on addressing cumulative civilian harm in armed conflict, which involves collaboration with the Universities of Oxford and Essens, Duke University, and the Israel Democracy Institute.
