Trademarks vs. Brands. This paper explores the growing disconnect between brands (where the modern value of corporations lie) and trademarks. I will explore how trademark law, a creature of the 20th century marketplace in goods and services, is a poor fit for protecting what is now the key asset of the world's most valuable companies: the brand. Where trademarks provide information, brands tell a story. Where trademarks signal the producer, the brand is the product. This Article will survey the basic doctrines of trademark law and demonstrate how each one has been stretched to accommodate the brand new world. Given the extraordinary importance of brands in the global economy, the growing disjuncture between the way brands function in different contexts and cultures and trademark law's simplified conceptualization of that function has become a problem with increasingly substantial policy implications.
